Equitable Services

The LEA funds staff responsible for various forms of supplemental professional development for teachers, paras, and school and district leaders. These staff include partial funding for the Curriculum and Instruction Specialists (C&Is) for K-5 ELA, 6-12 Math, K-12 Arts and Humanities, K-12 Social Studies, and K-12 Science and complete funding for 6-12 ELA; Curriculum and Instructional Specialists are the content experts for the LEA and remain current in all instructional practices, standards-based instruction, and evidence-based strategies and programs. These staff m_hbers also deliver professional development to all LEA instructional staff during school PD days, district PD days, and individually at school department meetings and data days. Additionally the C&Is host and facilitate district learning communities and district-wide data days and facilitate the continous re-development and revision of the LEA curriculum maps and pacing guides to meet challenging state standards. The LEA also partially funds a district Psychometrician through Title II whose responsibilities include analyzing progress monitoring data to identify strengths and weaknesses in standards-based instruction for individual teachers, schools, and the district as a whole. The Psychometrician meets with school level teams and school and district leaders to dig deeply into student data, help plan for instructional changes needed to support data, and evaluate the effectiveness of programs, strategies, and resources in meeting the academic needs of students. Additionally, the LEA fully funds the Professional Development Specialist who works in conjunction with C&Is, the Psychometrician and the Professional Development Center to plan, organize, and facilitate district professional development days to provide training and professional learning that supports district initiatives and school improvement plan goals.

LEA charter schools have elected to either contribute their Title II allocations back to the district to participate in district PD events and/or pay staff stipends to collaborate with guidance from the LEA to create their own proficiency scales and pacing guides along with common assessments all of which align to state standards.

Private Schools, through consultation, have determined their professional development needs and identified areas of strength and weakness for their individual school sites. The private schools have elected to contract professional development and use funds to participate in professional organizations and attend professional conferences.

Professional Learning for LEA staff: The Professional Development Center is the mecca for all professional learning within the LEA and a variety of opportunities are available to LEA staff (including the participating charter). Funding is used for: 1. Continued Canvas professional development- New teachers attend required training as part of the NET (New Educator Training) program, veteran staff are trained as Canvas Certified Educators to support their school sites, Model Classroom Innovator Cohorts are developed (through a Canvas certification course) to showcase Canvas integration in the classroom, Canvas Apps are purchased for Innovator Cohort participants to enhance the use of Canvas, Canvas Integration software is purchased to seamlessly integrate LEA staff apps with Canvas, and the PDC staff attends the Canvas Instructurecon Conference in Denver, Colorado to ensure training is up-to-date and relevant. Conference costs for attendees are Hotel/Registration package- 4@\$1095; Flights- 4@\$600; mileage and \$46/day per diem- \$750 total (4 people @ \$150 each). Subs are funded for participating staff at \$200/day. 2. Clinical Educator Training- Veteran teachers participate in a 2-day training to prepare them to become mentor teachers and continue their learning through hands-on activities before being assigned a mentee. Mentors and mentees are given coaching days Activity 1 and Instructional Rounds opportunities for NET teachers to visit the classrooms of highly effective teachers. Subs are funded at \$200/day. 3. The professional development staff attend the State and National Learning Forward conferences to stay current on professional learning strategies, and find innovative ways to meet the needs of all staff. The state conference takes place in St. Petersburg, FL (Registration- 4@\$400; Hotel @ \$200/night- \$2400 total (4 people for 3 nights each); Mileage and \$46/day per diem- \$750 total (4 people @ \$150 each)) and the National Conference will be held in Washington D.C.(Registration- 4 @ \$550; Hotel at \$220/night- \$4400 total (4 people at 5 nights each); Mileage and \$46/day per diem- \$750 total (4 people @ \$150 each)) 4. Leadership Development training for aspiring leaders provided through the Harvard Certificate in School Management and Leadership summer course. The course will conclude prior to June 30, 2024 and the cost is \$499/person for 44 participants. Professional learning for Private School Staff: 1. In improve intervention and remediation, Charlotte Prep is requesting funds to purchase a Language based Multi-sensory program; IMSE Comprehensive OG Plus and a training course at the University of Florida Institute UFLI. In addition, to increase staff education and development, funds will be used for PD opportunities such as the NAMC Training and Montessori Conference. 2. 10 improve classroom management and reduce class room disruptions, Family Christian Academy is requesting to fund IXL Professional development program, attend the Elevate Conference and purchase RenWeb upgrade. 3. Bator Wilderness Camp is requesting funds for Beacon/Impact courses so teachers can earn credits toward certificate renewal 4. Benesis Christian School is requesting funds to provide coaching for teachers through our third-party contractor; Catapult, as well as provide Beacon hours. In addition, funds will be sued for the ASCI Conference registration and the Conexus On-Demand Activity 2 professional development. 5. To provide teachers with instructional online training, Port Charlotte Adventist is requesting funds to purchase a professional development online program as well as fund onlien subscription memberships for teachers. 6. Redeemer Lutheran School is requesting funds to partially fund the registration fee for the Florida Georgia District Educators Conference. 7.5t Charles Borromeo School is requesting funds to provide coaching for teachers through our third-party contractor; Catapult, travel for a principal conference, Beacon Hours for online demand Teacher PD, and registration for the FETC conference. Professional Learning for Charter Staff: Hourly rate will be paid to all staff in grades K-12 to collaboratively develop proficiency scales guided by Charter leadership for teachers to consistently and objectively evaluate student progress to assist teachers in making data-informed instructional decisions to evaluate both teaching and learning. Prior to developing proficiency scales, teachers will participate in "Designing Effective Proficiency Scales" training provided by the Center for Competency Based Education-Activity 3 this training is 2 full day sessions (funded at \$2500 per day) which will take place prior to June 30, 2024.

Area of Focus 2: Recruitment and Retention

A. Provide a description of the local educational agency's systems of professional growth and improvement, such as induction for teachers, principals, or other school leaders and opportunities for building the capacity of teachers and opportunities to develop meaningful teacher leadership.

The LEA uses Title II funds to support the New Educator Training (NET) to acclimate new teacher to Charlotte County Public Schools. This program begins with a 2-day NET Academy that new teachers attend to receive professional development in LEA-wide instructional practices, receive information from the different LEA divisions, and participate in professional networking before being paired with veteran teacher mentors. The NET teachers, along with their mentors participate in ongoing, year-long professional development opportunities and instructional rounds and ob receive professional development opportunities and instructional rounds and ob receive professional development opportunities.

The LEA also annually subscribes to two online profesional development programs to assist teachers, school leaders, and district leaders in professional growth and improvement. The first, Beacon, houses courses related to ESE, Gifted, ESOL, and Reading endorsements (in addition to many others) in an effort to promote teachers to obtain these endorsements and certifications needed to serve these unique populations of students. The second, Educational Impact, houses courses mainly related to instructional delivery, classroom managment, effective planning and development of lessons, effective professional learning communities, high impact leadership strategies, and organizing school-wide programs such as SEL, PBIS, and restorative justice to promote academic growth, student engagement, and positive school culture.

In addition, the LEA Curriculum and Instructional Specialists actively seek out new and strugglin gschool staff to provide coaching and support to promote retention.

The LEA Curriculum and Instructional Specialist for each content area provide job-embedded coaching, training and support to all teachers with an intentional focus on those in high-needs schools. Schools that are falling below the district average in school grades, teacher evaluation scores, and overall school performance are targeted for grade level coaching, modeling of lessons, and C&I led data days to assist teachers in becoming more effective. The district psychometrician visits school sites as needed to help target instructional areas for improvement, identify ef—tive teachers in each of the assessment domains, assist with understanding data, and using classroom data to drive instruction.
